

In an attempt to give suspended Brothers an opportunity to become active again during these tough economic times, our Most Worshipful Grand Master has devised a plan named TARP - Traveling Again Reclamation Program. This program is designed to allow suspended members to reinstate for a more affordable fee.


Members suspended before June, 2002, can reinstate by paying the following:

- \$20.00 reinstatement fee
- \$10.00 taxes
- \$25.00 registration
- \$50.00 assessment (Have two years to pay the remaining \$150.00)
- \$105.00 Total

Members suspended after June, 2002, can reinstate by paying the following:

- \$20.00 reinstatement fee
- \$10.00 taxes
- \$25.00 registration
- \$50.00 assessment (Have two years to pay the remaining \$200.00)
- \$105.00 Total

TARP serves a two-fold purpose: (1.) It gives suspended Brothers a more affordable means of reinstating and (2.) It gives dying lodges a final opportunity to salvage their existence by increasing their numbers before being forced to close or merge. Our Grand Master has extended a challenge for the members of this jurisdiction to go out and reclaim our lost Brothers. TARP will be in effect through July 31, 2016.

Message from the Grand Medical Registrar

reetings Brothers,

I am pleased to talk to you one more time about men's health issues. I would like to discuss briefly an issue that most men, as well as, the population do not believe cause them

any problems. It is depression. An acronym that can be used is SIGECAPS. Let us proceed in order of this acronym:

S = sleep you are sleeping too much or too little.

I = interest which means you have lost interest in things that you normally enjoy.

G = guilty feelings over issues that one keeps focusing on or feeling you are worthless.

E = energy which means you find yourself not wanting to get up and go. As elderly people would say, moping around.

C = concentration difficult time focusing.

A = appetite disturbance in which one is eating too much or too little.

P = psychomotor this is having problems with agitation (anxiety) or being lethargic.

S = suicide having thoughts of suicide or preoccupation with death.

If you or someone you may know are experiencing any of these symptoms, please talk with your physician for further evaluation. I tell my patients that if the greatest man, when he was a man on this earth, got depressed then what about us. (I am assuming we all know when this happened.) Seeking help for depression is not a sign of weakness, but strength. It takes courage to face our fears.

Once again, the point I am trying to make is to have a good relationship with your physician. Please talk to someone that may help guide you in the right direction as these are issues that can be treated effectively.

Last, there will be a challenge issued to all lodges and brethren. The challenge is for the brethren to see which lodge can lose the most weight and keep blood pressures under good control. There will be more in depth details sent to each lodge. There will also be individual prizes for whomever achieves the greatest weight and blood pressure maintenance.


From Whence We've Come...

Snapshots into Alabama's Notable Members: Statesman, Soldier and Freemason, R.W. Herschel Vivian Cashin, Esq.

The seldom discussed secret of many Prince Hall Grand Lodges remains the conversation of the Compact Grand Lodge that shared the State with the Independent Grand Lodge. In Alabama, the Independent Grand Lodge was established in 1870; meanwhile, on her heels was the Alabama Compact Grand Lodge in 1874. Within her ranks were men of notable character and backgrounds. One of which was H.V. Cashin.

Bro. Cashin was born in 1854, in Augusta, Georgia. Born as the son of French/Cherokee/African mother Lucenda Boudre Cashin and Irish father John H. Cashin. Cashin's childhood was far from the norm living in Augusta, as his father being white who bucked social norms by marrying his wife of color.

Just before the Civil War and emboldening of Southern traitors to rebel against the Republic, John moved his wife to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania where she was listed, along with Bro. Cashin in the 1860 Census as free inhabitants.



In 1870's, Bro. Cashin would move from Pennsylvania, to Georgia and ultimately wind up in Montgomery, Alabama. In Montgomery, he would become one of the Father's of Reconstruction in the State of Alabama, being elected in 1874, re-elected in 1876 and leaving office in 1878. Although he did not win re-election in 1878, he broke boundaries becoming the first African-American to be admitted to the Alabama Bar. He would later marry his lifelong companion Ms. Minnie Virginia Brewster Cashin on July 2, 1879.

It was during the 1870's that Bro. Cashin would become a member of the Rising Sun Lodge in approximately 1873. He was listed as the Secretary of Rising Sun Lodge, No. 5 under the Alabama Compact Grand Lodge in 1874 and also the Grand Secretary Pro-Tem of the same year. He would later serve as Grand Secretary until the 1878 Consolidation. Thereafter, he was a member of Rising Sun Lodge, No. 8 under the current Prince Hall Grand Lodge.

Bro. Cashin would also serve his country by joining the 10th US Calvary. His stellar performance and political acumen saw him receive an appointment by President Garfield as the Railway mail Clerk in Decatur, AL. He was later appointed by President McKinley as the Registrar of the US Land Offices in Decatur.

Bro. Cashin became a well-respected lawyer in Decatur and Huntsville. In 1893, Bro. Cashin lobbied the Decatur City Council to its open first Free Colored School. He would later become the third African-American City Councilman in Decatur. His political involvement also spanned serving as a Delegate to the National Republican Conventions in 1896, 1900 and 1904.

In 1899, Bro. Cashin and Charles Alexander penned a book entitled, *Under Fire with the Tenth Cavalry*. The work is used as a contemporary description of African-American soldiers during the Indian expeditions and the Spanish-American War.

Bro. Cashin would later make his final journey to the House not made with hands, Eternal in the Heavens, on March 25, 1924. He served his family, the State of Alabama, his Country and his Grand Lodge faithfully.

Convention Coordinator and Corporate Liaison RW Gregory Clark Elected FAMU National Alumni Association's President

regory Clark, a Lieutenant Colonel in the U.S. Army Reserves, has been elected President of the Florida A. & M. University National Alumni Association.

Clark received 82 percent of the vote to defeat Seaborn Dixon III, who collected 18 percent. Clark succeeds Tommy Mitchell and becomes the Association's 18th president.

Clark, 46, lives in Chelsea, Alabama, and works as a financial planner with Prudential Advisors. He has been in the U.S. Army Reserves for 27 years and serves as a commander with the 7242 Installation Medical Support Unit, in Gulfport, Mississippi. He is a Past Master of Magnolia Lodge No. 218 in District No. 5. He serves the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Alabama as Convention Coordinator and Corporate Liaison.

He served as First Vice President and Convention Chairman under Mitchell for six years. In 2014, FAMU President Elmira Mangum appointed Clark Chairman of the President's Alumni Advisory Committee on Athletics.

Clark said his goals include increasing total national alumni membership to 10,000 by 2019, including 5,000 life members and 1,000 student members.

Currently, there are about 3,400 members, including 1,500 life members, with regular and associate members making up the balance.

Clark said he will be appointing a strong membership team to recruit new members. He will also target non-FAMU graduates, including FAMU faculty, employees, and trustees, who can become associate members.

"One way of boosting numbers is to bring on board the Marching 100 Band Alumni Association and the Baseball Alumni Association as affinity groups that would be affiliated with the FAMU National Alumni Association, while their members maintain their ties to those organizations."

Other major priorities, Clark said, are to increase revenues and to strengthen association relationships with federal, state and local governments, through the creation of a NAA Governmental Affairs Network.

He plans to announce the launch of a fundraising campaign to raise \$500,000 by the association's national convention in May in Tampa. "That money will go toward providing retention scholarships for juniors and seniors who now drop out because they have run out of money. Sometimes, it can be as little as \$3,000," he said.



"We want to take care of juniors and seniors who can't come back and register because they have no resources," Clark said.

He said the money also could be used to help potential applicants pay for their application fees and other expenses.

Clark graduated from FAMU with a bachelor's degree in business economics in 1993. He also attended the U.S. Army Command & General Staff College from 2009-2010.

"My first introduction to the FAMU NAA was right after college," Clark said. "I was looking for a way to stay connected to that Rattler Spirit that I experienced while in school. The NAA became my extended family and I jumped at the chance to help build the alumni association from the inside out."

With the Association, he has served as Chapter President, Southern Region Vice President and Election Chairman.

Clark said he wants the National Association to have a hands-on relationship with University President Mangum and with trustees in addressing university challenges such as recruitment and fundraising. About \$1.5 million was contributed by alumni between July 1, 2014 and last October.

"At the end of the day, my priority is the students," he said. "The student body makes FAMU."


Stillman Lodge No. 490 Sharing and Caring in the Community

The Lodge and Chapter were blessed through the experience and interaction. individual who loved his family and who was passionate about life. He will truly be missed by those that knew him best, his family, friends and Masonic PHAmily.


