

Reclamation Drive (TARP)

In an attempt to give suspended Brothers an opportunity to become active again during these tough economic times, our Most Worshipful Grand Master has devised a plan named • TARP- Traveling Again Reclamation Program. • This program is designed to allow suspended members to reinstate for a more affordable fee.

Members suspended before June, 2002, can reinstate by paying the following:

- \$20.00 reinstatement fee
- \$10.00 taxes
- \$25.00 registration
- \$50.00 assessment (Have two years to pay the remaining \$150.00)
- \$105.00 Total

Members suspended after June, 2002, can reinstate by paying the following:

- \$20.00 reinstatement fee
- \$10.00 taxes
- \$25.00 registration
- \$50.00 assessment (Have two years to pay the remaining \$200.00)
- \$105.00 Total

TARP serves a two-fold purpose: (1.) It gives suspended Brothers a more affordable means of reinstating and (2.) It gives dying lodges a final opportunity to salvage their existence by increasing their numbers before being forced to close or merge. Our Grand Master has extended a challenge for the members of this jurisdiction to go out and reclaim our lost Brothers. TARP will be in effect through July 31, 2018.

From Whence We've Come...

In Their Own Words – PART II

In preparation to write the official history of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Alabama, I've prepared a series of addresses made by our early Grand Masters. As such, when we discuss our early leadership, in hindsight, it would remain more appropriate to actually catch a glimpse of what they were thinking, experiencing and actually saying. Therefore, I am releasing an early glimpse of another work that will be published within the next year, entitled, In Their Own Words: The Writings of the Grand Master of Alabama

What our readers should note is that, in context, there were three (3) African American Grand Lodges in Alabama:

- 1. Most Worshipful Grand Lodge Ancient Free & Accepted Masons of Alabama Formed in 1870 Independent, which was a descendent of African Lodge No. 459;
- 2. Most Worshipful Grand Lodge Ancient York Masons of Alabama Formed in 1874 Formed under the National Compact; and
- 3. Most Worshipful Grand Lodge Ancient York Masons of Alabama Formed in 1874 Formed under the National Compact; and

Most Worshipful Sovereign Grand Lodge Ancient Free & Accepted Masons of Alabama – Formed in 1878 as a consolidation with (or absorption of the) Compact Grand Lodge. – Independent – which would later change its name to what is now called the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge Free & Accepted Masons of Alabama, which continues as a descendent of African Lodge No. 459.

I present to you Alabama's First Grand Master since its initial formation in 1870, the Honorable...

FRANKLIN D. TAYLOR Past Grand Master 1870-71, 1872-74



The writer has identified select addresses made by Grand Master Taylor and has chosen to transcribe them verbatim without corrections. While Grand Master Taylor's addresses are in entirety they reflect an understanding of the times and thoughts of the leader of the Craft during those times.

Saturday, June 21, 1873

Brethren of the Fraternity:

We are permitted again to assemble for the fourth time in the capacity of a Grand Lodge, and myself, your humble servant, acting as Grand Master – which position I have, to the best of my ability, filled to the interest of the Craft – but with what amount of satisfaction I am unable to say; however, I hope the Craft will overlook my shortcomings and take the will for the deed.

Since we last assembled, many of our kind friends and beloved associates have fallen by the way, yet we should return our heartfelt thanks for the many blessings which we have enjoyed since we last met.

Let us be stimulated to press forward in the path of duty, not turning to the right nor to the left, but striving ever to keep in the view those true masonic virtues "brotherly love, relief and truth." Let our charity extend to all created beings upon the face of the habitable globe; then can it be said that we are masons indeed; then will the time come when vice, malice and hatred will pass away as a vapor before the breeze.

I regret to announce to you that dire necessity has compelled me to suspend the St. John's Lodge, No. 2, after every effort had been exhausted to save such action; that body, in direct violation of masonic law, holding a dispensation from the Grand Lodge of Missouri Compact, while, working under the Grand Lodge of this State by warrant. After their suspension, they were visited by one R.W. Lawton, claiming to the Grand Master of Missouri, but what has since become of him or them, I am unable to say. I would further state that the jewels, moneys and implements of St. John's Lodge have never been secured, on account of the individual dishonesty of its Master.

You will pardon your humble servant for alluding to the Nation Compact, (so called,) which is crumbling to dust – and seeing the fast decaying, self-constituted useless innovation, I resolved not to let it die without giving it a passing notice, as it is my opinion, we will not long be troubled with that illegal body, which took its rise in 1847. Some of its most zealous supporters are now counseling their votaries to cease adhering to the grand humbug and establish Grand Lodge in keeping with out Ancient Rules and Regulations. We will then be united into one common band of friends and brethren.

My correspondence has been very interesting, though not very large, among which, are the following Lodges, viz: Arkansas, Michigan, and Ontario; the latter was formed October 22d, 1872, and the Grand Officers installed by M.W.G. Master W.T. Boyd, of Ohio. I respectfully recommend that this Grand Lodge pass suitable resolutions of welcome to them. I have appointed the proper representatives near those Grand Bodies, while they have made their appointments near this.

I have had correspondence with the Grand Lodge of Louisiana, Florida, Tennessee, Ohio, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Michigan, California, District of Columbia and the Grand Orient of France.

This year, I am proud to say, has been fraught with good for the fraternity; the genuine principles of Masonry are being diffused, while innovations of whatever nature, are fast decaying – though the whites maintain the stubborn resistance towards acknowledging the colored Free Masons. My brethren, let us rejoice, notwithstanding that the time is not far distant, when every Mason of whatever shade or complexion will united in the Grand design of communicating happiness. Much has been said by our white brethren concerning our affiliation with the Grand Orient of France, which is established upon the true principles of Ancient Craft Masonry, which regards no man or set of men on account of nationality, but looks upon the institution (as founded by our forefathers, and handed down to us by tradition – not as a nation institution, if it had been, it would have long since lost its virtue,) but as an universal order, recognizing all men who would be the suppressors of vice and the inculcators of virtue.

I have visited all the Lodges in this jurisdiction, and find them all in a healthy condition, their numbers have been greatly augmented, with care has the timber been selected.

I regret to announce that our outer door has been alarmed during this masonic year by the grim monster death, and removed from our midst our dear and beloved brethren R.F. Butler and R.W. Simon Bartlett, Grand S.D., both of Olive Branch, Lodge, No. 1; and we find that our sister Grand Lodges has suffered to great extent. Tennessee has lost one of her brightest lights in the demise of Bro. Oliver Thompson, of Rock City Lodge, Nashville. Permit me to call your attention to the death of Bro. Nelson Cook, of Olive Branch Lodge, San Francisco, California – he was a devoted Christian. I respectfully recommend that a suitable place in these proceedings be inscribed to their memory. Their walk in life was an assurance that they dwell in that house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens, where the wicked cease from troubling, and the weary are forever at rest. Let us do our duty as Masons, though others fail, then can we enjoy the happy reflection consequent upon a well spent life, and die in the hope of a glorious immortality.

This world's to them a shadow,

They have not worked in vain,

They've climbed the top of Jacob's Ladder,

They therefore heaven hath gamed.

To dwell forever with the just,

In peaceful, joyful love,



I respectfully recommend the repeal of Article IX, Sec. 3 –all therein contained, empowering the Grand Lodge to levey a tax of Two Dollars for Diplomas, and One Dollar be inserted in lieu thereof – also, Sec. 5 of Article X, so that the charge may not exceed Forty Dollars, -- Ministers of the Gospel excepted – by so doing, it would in my opinion, conduce to the interest of the Craft, and would disseminate the Order throughout the interior of the State.

Monday, June 22, 1874

Dear Brethren:

One more year has rolled around, and we are thus blessed, being permitted to assemble in the capacity of Masons, to return thanks for the manifold blessings we have enjoyed during this masonic year. While we do assemble in accordance with ancient usage upon this checkered floor, let our voices ascend to heaven with praises and thanksgiving, laying our choicest gifts at the altar of Him who doeth all things well.

Let us, dear brethren, be of one mind, working for the upbuilding[sic] of the whole human family, wherever dispersed around the globe. May we conduct our present session with that magnanimity that it may have been well said: "that he who can best work best agree." It is known by all intelligent Masons that upon the superstructure the whole world owes its grace and beauty.

While we believe that before the end of time it will be the instrument used – as it is designed –to bring into the fields of our land many who otherwise would be inevitably lost.

No creed or condition should make us swerve rom our duty or violate our sacred vows, we being all of one common parent, knowing no distinction but that of goodness. My brethren, too much vigilance cannot be exercised over the ballot box that the glory of our time honored institution may perfect its desired work. It is to be regretted that the utility of the institution is not as comprehensive with a majority of its members as it should be. I therefore most respectfully recommend that the craft apply more of its study to masonic jurisprudence, as it is very essential that we should know the business in which we are engaged, that the world may be impressed with its good effects.

A comprehensive knowledge of the masonic arts is expected, not only in this jurisdiction, but equally so in others whose interests are identical with ours, using all of the implements that were used by our most ancient Grand Masters, that the craft may be able to pursue their labor in erecting the temple that so much light has emanated from, spreading its illuminating rays all over the terrestrial globe and disseminating its light and knowledge wherever Christians have taken up their abode.

Even the late Dr. Livingstone, near the burning sands of the Sahara, was made to feel the wholesome effects wrought through the craft, otherwise they would have remained at a perpetual distance groveling in the dark abyss of benighted ignorance. Even there he was received with cheerful hearts and open hands.

Let us, then, be stimulated with the hope that after the closing of our earthly Grand Lodge, we may be received in that Grand Lodge above, where all good Masons hope to arrive by the end of that theological ladder which Jacob, the patriarch, saw extending from earth to heaven, and were inscribed thereon Faith, Hope and Charity.

We must have Faith in God, Hope in Immortality, and Charity of all Mankind; let him be upon the lowest spoke of fortune's wheel – he is our brother.

In my last year's report, I admitted that I could not let the Compact die without giving it a passing notice, as there were no coherent[sic] to it. The Lodges of Ontario, C.W., of the States of Michigan, Massachusetts and Missouri having severed themselves from the grand innovation, I respectfully recommend that suitable Resolutions be passed welcoming the Grand Lodges of the States above named.

Brethren, it requires no cogent arguments to prove that it is almost a thing of the past. Wherever the innovation is adhered to its adherents are offering resolutions tending to the severance of their ties from the useless humbug, which took its rise in 1847 pushed forward by designing men.

The independence of the Grand Lodge of Missouri is due to the Rev. Moses Dickson, R.W.P.G.M., and that of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts to Bro. A.W.A. De Leon, who is indefatigable [sic] in the good work of breaking down all innovations from whatever source they may come. These noble acts could have emanated only from men of clear heads and expansive hearts; which acts should be revered by all lovers of the institution. Long may they live to defend the right.

My correspondence during this year has not been as extensive as that of last year, which is easily accounted for: The Grand Lodge at her last session having established a Committee on Foreign Communications, which left it optional with me as to correspondence. We have every reason to be hopeful that before the centennial anniversary of American independence every vestige of innovations will have disappeared.

During the recess of the Grand Lodge I appointed the following officers as my deputies: William H. Council [sic], for the Northern District of the State, and Rev. G.W. Bryant, for the Southern District of the State.

The accessions to our ranks have been encouraging in the extreme; much care having been observed in selecting the timber.

FOREIGN REPRESENTATIVES APPOINTED DURING RECESS

I have visited all of the Lodges under this jurisdiction, and am proud to say that work in all of them is uniform and encouraging in the extreme.

I granted a dispensation to a certain number of Master Masons at Greenville, Ala., empowering them to assemble and work as a Lodge until the session of the Grand Lodge; empowering them to initiate, pass and raise.

Also a dispensation to Hiram Lodge, No. 3. I most respectfully recommend the passage of an act allowing Lodges in the interior of the state to confer the degrees for \$25. pp.

DEATH

I am pained to announce to this assembly the death of R.W. Deputy Grand Master L.J. Williams, on the 15th of October, 1874, in the city of Montgomery, 5874. The grim monster has been amongst us and taken from our midst one who was honored and respected by all who was associated with him, as an honest upright citizen, a loving and devoted husband, a kind and indulgent father. His remains were conveyed to their last resting place by the members of King Solomon's Lodge, accompanied by the R.W.D.D.G. Master G.W. Bryant, who officiated as Chaplain, J.H. Bryant as Marshal and myself acting as Master.

Much of my time has been spent out of the State during the masonic year, circumstances over which I had no control compelling my absence.

Message from the Grand Medical Registrar

reetings brothers. I am briefly writing today about two subjects that are quite important. The first is universal precautions. The country is experiencing an epidemic with the current flu virus. Unfortunately, this virus has killed multiple people in the United States. Please protect yourself and your family as well as others by washing your hands, using hand sanitizer and facial masks if necessary. Cover your cough by using a tissue and disposing of it properly in a waste container. If you cough in your hand, please wash your hands or use hand sanitizer. Avoid large crowds if you feel sick, please do not try to work as this can expose your colleagues. There are many of you that are very hard working and have good work ethics but you must use some "work sense" by realizing the risk, if you are exhibiting flu like symptoms, may come at too great of an expense to you and your colleagues. If you think you are experiencing flu like symptoms that may consist of multiple symptoms including fevers, stuffiness, body aches, chills, and sore throat, just to name some of the symptoms, please seek out medical treatment. The flu vaccine still remains the best defense against the flu virus. It typically takes about two weeks for the vaccine to promote resistance against the flu virus. Therefore, please obtain the flu vaccination in a timely manner as this can prevent you from obtaining the vaccine. Talk to your physician about the timely administration of the flu vaccine.

My second topic is concerning chest pain. Chest pain can be a tricky subject depending on the individual experiencing the symptoms of chest pain. I was talking to a friend recently that informed me that he had an episode of chest pain that lasted for a couple of days. He stated that he "did the old folks remedy and drank a warm glass of water with baking soda." Unfortunately, this remedy did not resolve his symptoms. It was not until several days later that he went to his physician and hand some stents placed for blocked arteries. I do not want to cause a panic as not all chest pain is related to cardiac problems. I do; however, want to emphasize that this person had known cardiac disease and I put him in a different category. I was greatly disappointed as I have had talks with patients like him who have taken the same approach as he has done in the past. My message, once again, is that if you have a health issue that is documented, please seek out medical attention if you should experience similar symptoms. I grew up in Mississippi and am well aware of the multiple home remedies that kept us out of the hospital at that time. I wish that I could even replicate some of those old home remedies. If you have a documented health issue, please follow up with your physician for reoccurrence of symptoms.

Different people can present, in different ways, with the same health complaint. We as health professionals have heard and seen the many different presentations for the same health complaint. Get to know your body. Some people may think that statement is an oxymoron as they will state it is my body and I know my body. You would be surprised at the number of people that do not know, for example, that they had a mole in a certain location of their body until they were told. Monitor your body and love your body. A simple body function is usually not fully appreciated until that body function is somehow impeded.

As men, we need to become more aggressive with our healthcare. I joke with my patients that women outlive us because they consider their body a precious commodity. It is time for men to be more involved with their individual healthcare. There are a lot of men that too often do not come to the doctor for a routine check-up unless a family member schedules the appointment for them. There are men that do take their health seriously and stay on top of their regularly scheduled doctors appointments. I am not talking about these men. We as men need to take the approach; #time to schedule.

I would like to leave you with a little food for thought. I had a professor that educated me to the fact that you will never learn everything there is to know in medicine. He also stated that if I ever did learn everything there is to know in medicine then I needed to retire. I often tell people that, no matter who you are, this is the approach we need to take in life, because you will never know everything there is to know in life. Stay humble brothers. God bless.



Grand Junior Deacon R.W. Carlton Jones

rother Carlton Jones thrives on family and leaving a legacy for his three sons, Corey, Clayton and Clark. He is a family man and believes that every man should lead by example to be a positive example for his family. Bro. Jones graduated from M.D. Collins High School in College Park, Georgia in 1980. He immediately enlisted in the United States Navy just as his dad and granddad had done before him. So, it was no surprise for all three of his sons to enlist in the Navy upon graduation from high school. Bro. Jones met his wife of 29 years in the Navy, Kathleen Jones. He is an alumnus of Savannah State University, 1993, where he received his Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice. Bro. Jones graduated Magna Cum Laude and was cited for several leadership awards while attending SSU. Later on, Bro. Jones attended Troy University and received his Master's degree in Education in 2003. He and his wife are proud members of the American Legion. Bro. Carlton Jones' roots come from Tuskegee, Alabama where his mom was born and raised. His dad was born and raised in a town not far away, Opelika, Alabama. Bro. Jones path to masonry began at an early age.



As a child, Bro. Jones was always intrigued with the masons. He would watch them perform masonic rites at the funerals of his granddad and uncles, who were masons. His father, who was a Prince Hall mason, took Bro. Jones with him as he traveled the country. His father was a long-distance truck driver and took the opportunity to mentor to his son at every chance he got. According to Bro. Jones he never fully discussed what masonry was but always told him it was a good organization to be a part of. Bro. Jones felt a void in his life and knew he had to find out what that void was. Little did he know that he was surrounded by the answer his entire life. As he became older, Bro. Jones would talk to his great uncle at length on his many visits to Gary, Indiana. His great uncle left an impression on Bro. Jones in a huge way. Booker T. Jones, who passed last year at the age of 90, was heavily involved in masonry until the day he died. As Bro. Jones began to wind down his naval career, he got to spend more time with his ailing great uncle. It was during this time that Bro. Jones asked his uncle about masonry and wanted to know about his journey in masonry. It was easy for any young man to be intrigued listening to Booker T. Jones. He was a man deep in moral values and always seemed to have a keen sense of knowledge on any subject that was broached. The phrase "hard work pays off" could have easily been coined by his great-uncle. Bro. Jones took pride in knowing that his great uncle rose to the highest level in masonry, 33rd degree and Grand Master of the MWPHGL of Indiana.

Bro. Jones path to masonry was laid out before him. After retiring from the Navy after 21 years of distinguished service, Bro. Jones decided to teach and accepted a job in the Phenix City School system as the Sr. Naval Science Instructor. The position called for a senior military officer to come in and lead the JROTC program. Bro. Jones had worked his way from the bottom of the enlisted ranks, E-1 to become a Naval Officer, retiring at the rank of Lieutenant Commander. Bro. Jones was determined to be there for his family and retiring to become a teacher and coach was one of the best decisions he could have made. Bro. Jones immediately made an impact in the JROTC program at Central High School. His unit was awarded eleven consecutive Distinguished Unit Awards, the highest award given to a NJROTC unit. He was personally responsible for assisting more than 30 high school JROTC students with earning full ROTC college scholarships and appointments to West Point and the Naval Academy. Bro. Jones was asked to coach the junior high basketball team and later the 9th grade and JV basketball teams. He was also assigned as assistant varsity basketball coach for Central and in 2014, he filled in as the varsity head coach when the coach took ill and led the team to a big playoff state tournament win. Coaching has always been a passion for Bro. Jones. Having three boys, and coaching all three of them in football, baseball, and basketball was special.

Bro. Carlton Jones was raised as a mason in Phoenix Lodge No. 428 in Phenix City, Alabama. He didn't just want to be a member, he wanted to embrace masonry and sought out to seek more light about the craft. Bro. Jones served as Tyler of the lodge, Steward, Junior Deacon, Senior Deacon, Treasurer, Junior Warden, Senior Warden and Worshipful Master. Things didn't always go as well as he would have liked in his early years as a mason. Bro. Jones remembers, meeting in the basement of a church for many years, some meeting nights being cold and damp, but the brothers still came every meeting night to practice their craft. After his second year in the east, Phoenix Lodge No. 428 was awarded 2nd Place for Lodge of the Year in the city category. Bro. Jones took notice of RW Morris Tooles and RW George Echols, both Grand Officers in District 7. Both who have led by example and are well respected in the Grand Lodge. 



George W. Braxdall Lodge No. 28 Helps During the Christmas Season


