

Members suspended before June, 2002, can reinstate by paying the following:

- \$25.00 reinstatement fee
- \$25.00 taxes
- \$25.00 registration
- \$50.00 assessment (Have two years to pay the remaining \$150.00)
- \$125.00 Total

Members suspended after June, 2002, can reinstate by paying the following:

- \$25.00 reinstatement fee
- \$25.00 taxes
- \$25.00 registration
- \$50.00 assessment (Have two years to pay the remaining \$200.00)
- \$125.00 Total

TARP serves a two-fold purpose: (1.) It gives suspended Brothers a more affordable means of reinstating and (2.) It gives dying lodges a final opportunity to salvage their existence by increasing their numbers before being forced to close or merge. Our Grand Master has extended a challenge for the members of this jurisdiction to go out and reclaim our lost Brothers. TARP will be in effect until further notice.

It is very important that we assemble in Selma, Alabama in mass numbers. This is an opportune time to stand in solidarity in support of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, which is currently under attack nationwide, in a state where a federal court recently struck down the newly drawn congressional map (gerrymandering). Consider this March as a time to remember for the seasoned brother and a history lesson for the younger brother. I am counting on you to help make this another great success.

From Whence We've Come...

Sheriff Lucius D. Amerson

ucius D Amerson was born October 7, 1933 in Greene County, Alabama, which predominantly was agricultural and farming area, where the economic conditions were at an extremely low ebb at that time. It could be said that anyone who survived in that locality and was able to be reared in those povertystricken conditions, and was still able to rise to any prominent status in society had experienced nothing less than a miracle. Amerson left Greene County at age 17, after having dropped out of high school in the 11th grade, and entered the military on March 9, 1951. During his tenure in the military, he rose from the rank of private to sergeant first class. He saw duty in the Pacific and Korean Conflicts and also


spent a tour in the European Theater, where he served in Germany. He went to the most prominent military posts in the United States, the last being at Fort Bragg, North Carolina with the 82nd Airborne Division as a paratrooper. Perhaps the last period of service was the most enjoyable of all his 91/2 years of continuous military service.

After serving for several years in the military he started thinking about his career ahead as he had not finished high school, Amerson felt it necessary to do so, and therefore went to school in the Army at Fort Riley, Kansas under the Army Education Program, and received a high school diploma. Later, he decided that he must go to college because he felt that an African-American would not be able to excel to his highest degree in the military because of all the bigotry and prejudice which was ever present among white offers and other enlisted men in military units.

In 1958, black people across the country became seriously involved in civil rights issues and turmoils. Consequently, Amerson felt that he would not be able to contribute his fair share to the cause by remaining in the military. He was discharged honorably on September 17, 1959, and enrolled in Tuskegee Institute, Tuskegee Institute, Alabama in a curriculum of Electronics. Amerson further found that the knowledge he had acquired in the military was not very useful to him in the pursuit of any technical curricula in college, but it had taught him how to deal with humanity and the social problems of his community and had shown him a sense of equity pointing toward an interest in politics, more specifically law enforcement. Because it appeared to him that much of the conflicts between the "haves and have-nots" occurred in the execution of the law by white oppressors, and he was simply tired of seeing his people subjected to these reprisals.

While enrolled in college, he worked part-time as a postal employee in Montgomery, Alabama, and in Dietetic Service at the VA Hospital, in Tuskegee, Alabama. It was during this time that he met and married his wife, the former Windora E. Smith of Birmingham, Alabama.

Perhaps always in the back of Amerson's mind was the ambition to be a political leader, and the opportunity came in 1966 when he qualified and ran for Sheriff of Macon County, Alabama. A part of his dream was realized when he was elected to the position on November 8, 1966. After his election, Amerson continued his studies at Tuskegee Institute with a change in major from Electronics to Political Science. He also graduated from two civil and criminal investigation schools, attended law enforcement seminars at Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio, and Michigan State University, East Lansing, Michigan, and several other law enforcement seminars sponsored by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. He also attended a police executive conference at the invitation of the Attorney General of the United States.




Amerson held membership in the Democratic National

Committee, The Alabama League for the Advancement of Education, Macon County Democratic Club, Masonic Order, Shriners, IBPOEW, American Legion, National Sheriff's Association, NAACP, International Platform Association, YMCA, Lions Club, International.

He was affiliated with Mount Olive Missionary Baptist Church, Tuskegee, Alabama.

Amerson was listed in Who's Who in Alabama, Who's Who in the South and Southwest, and International Biographical Society of London, England, and Outstanding Personalities of the South.

Brother Amerson served as Sheriff of Macon County for twenty years (1967-1987), being re-elected four times. Brother Amerson passed away on March 15, 1994.



Lucius Amerson, at left in the white shirt, is sworn in as sheriff of Macon County in January 1967. In June 1966, Amerson was the first African American elected sheriff in Alabama since Reconstruction, and according to some accounts, the first in the South. The passage of the Voting Rights Act in 1965 strengthened voting rights and brought into Alabama and other southern states federal officials to oversee voting procedures. With him in the photograph are his African American deputies Eddie M. Ivory and Joseph Meriwether, his white deputy Arthur L. Knowles, and Probate Judge Preston Hornsby administering the oath of office.

PHYSICIAN, now deceased, of Tuscaloosa, Alabama. Born in Tallassee, Alabama. Graduate of Tuskegee Institute, and the Leonard Medical College at Shaw University. Thirty-five years of medical practice in Tuscaloosa.

Member of Medical Staff, Druid City Hospital, and of the John A. Andrew Clinic, Tuskegee Institute.

Trustee, Stillman College, Tuscaloosa: Member of Advisory Board, Alabama Federation of Colored Women's Clubs.

In the first World War he was Medical Officer of the 317th Sanitary Corps, attached to the famous 92nd Division.

Chairman of the Negro Advisory City Board of Education; member of Board of Directors of the Community Center; member of the Tuscaloosa City Chamber of Commerce.

Member, and Trustee of hunter's Chapel A. M. E. Zion Church, Tuscaloosa. Master of Little Warrior Lodge. Grand Medical Registrar of Masons of Alabama. 33rd degree Mason. Elk. President of Beta Phi Sigma Chapter of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc. Member of Khedive Temple of Shriners; Member of Veterans of Foreign War.

He had extensive downtown real estate holdings, including a two-story office building which housed his own medical office, as well as, others.

Married: Miss Marie Sanford, Children: Mrs. Dorothy Landers, of Tucson, Arizona, and Sanford D. McKenzie of Tuscaloosa.

Died: December 17, 1951.






Brother Jason M. Jones, Esq. New Southern Province Polemarch

In The Spotlight

Each quarter the MWPHGL of Alabama will place one of our worthy brothers In The Spotlight. The worthy brother placed In The Spotlight this quarter is:

Brother Quinton T. Ross, Jr.

r. Quinton T. Ross, Jr., serves with distinction as the 15th President of his alma mater, Alabama State University. He is a servant leader who set a bold vision for ASU. Dr. Ross assumed the helm of the University with a vision of growth and innovation and has been the driving force behind new initiatives and partnerships under his guiding mantra of "Moving ASU 150 years forward." Under President Ross's leadership, the University has experienced several significant achievements. Beginning his presidency at Alabama State University in October of 2017, President Ross took on the daunting task of bringing fiscal stability to the financially challenged institution by reducing debt, imposing across-the-campus budget cuts, reallocating resources, and eliminating wasteful spending. Dr. Ross's transformative fiscal leadership has led to an upgrade in the institution's Moody's bond rating.

As a personal and intentional priority, he immediately set out to improve the University's declining infrastructure. With an aggressive plan, leveraging relationships and partnerships, Ross and his administration completed numerous capital projects including a campus-wide asphalt resurfacing project, installation of new campus-wide security cameras, replacement of boilers, HVAC systems and elevators, and residence halls renovations that included roof replacements which total an estimated 13 million dollars.

In 2021, Ross and his leadership team successfully ushered the University through reaffirmation by its accrediting body, the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC), with no recommendations, through 2030. Since becoming the 15th President, Dr. Ross has led the development and implementation of an ambitious strategic plan and agenda for the institution, titled FOCUS 2030: Advancing the Legacy and Bridging Communities through Commitment, Collaborations, and Creativity. Alabama State University has risen to new heights in providing access and equitable opportunities for students. Under the leadership of Dr. Ross, ASU has seen improvements in academics, enrollment and retention, fundraising, partnerships, and student success. Amid enrollment stability, ASU saw its retention and graduation rates increase. According to the U.S. News and World Report 2022, ASU is in the Top 25 HBCUs, moving up in rank by 10 spots since 2021, now ranked at 22.

Dr. Ross has set a new standard for fundraising at ASU. During the first two years of his administration, fundraising at the institution increased by nearly 130 percent with more than \$7.6 million raised over two years through corporate and individual donations, as well as increased legislative appropriations. More recently, the University has experienced a 205% total giving increase with a 20% increase in the total number of gifts received. Notably, his charismatic leadership has encouraged donors to increase the size of their contributions, growing the average gift size by 154%. The University also has experienced a 150% increase in its total number of donors. A good steward of resources with a commitment to fiscal responsibility, Dr. Ross leads an advancement team that raises 15% more per advancement staff member than its peer institutions and 67% more per dollar invested. President Ross's increased focus on alumni engagement and prior established partnerships, coupled with his ability to develop innovative mutually beneficial relationships have transformed ASU's growth and success.

Dr. Ross has led the charge for development and constituent relations, under John O. Killens' concept of CommUniversity. ASU has forged new partnerships and re-energized existing relations with international, federal, state, and local stakeholders. Dr. Ross has increased the institutional partnerships to enhance the institution's visibility. He also has established a positive and open line of communication with local, state, and national media. Dr. Ross has been engaged by national media as an expert on the future of Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), thereby allowing for an elevation of the University's brand. He has appeared on several networks such as ESPN, CNN, and Cheddar to name a few. Dr. Ross has been featured in Bloomberg News, Chronicle of Higher Education, HBCU Connect Magazine, HBCU Digest, Reuters News Service, and USA Today. Dr. Ross continues to be engaged and serves as a pivotal voice in the community. In the wake of the George Floyd killing in 2020, Dr. Ross pinned an Open Op-Ed, What do we tell our children and our Students, which was published in the Atlanta Daily World Magazine (June 1, 2020), New Pittsburgh Courier (June 1, 2020) and Diversity Issues in Higher Education (June 3, 2020).

Recently, President Ross was appointed to the Board of Advisors of the White House Initiative on Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) by President Joe Biden. President Ross was recognized as a Yellowhammer-15 Hall of Fame 2021 and given to those Alabamians who help to shape the state of Alabama in a positive and meaningful way. In June of 2021, Alabama Today Magazine named President Ross to its annual listing of Alabama's 32 Powerful and Influential Alabamians to know. He was awarded the Leadership Award by the Alabama Alliance of Black School Educators 2021. Dr. Ross's growing prominence as an educational leader was recognized by his election to the position of vice-chairman of the Alabama Commission on Higher Education's Council of Presidents. The Council consists of the presidents of each public four-year institution of higher education in the state of Alabama, as well as the State Superintendent of Education and the presidents of three public two-year institutions of higher education.

Dr. Ross has made it his mission to be a community advocate for public education and to help young people "grasp the light of knowledge through embracing diversity." Dr. Ross is a distinguished career educator with more than 27 years of experience in Higher and K-12 public education. Dr. Ross held various leadership positions in Secondary Education including being a classroom teacher, administrative assistant, assistant principal, and high school principal. Before becoming President of his alma mater, he had begun his fourth term in the Alabama State Senate after having been elected to his first term in 2002. While serving in the Senate, Dr. Ross distinguished himself as a true statesman and was one of seven African Americans serving in the Alabama State Senate. In 2015, he was elected as Senate Minority Leader and the first Minority Leader elected to a four-year term. During his legislative tenure, Dr. Ross served on numerous legislative committees and was an established legislative leader with an unwavering advocacy for public education, as well as issues dealing with child safety and the general welfare of all Alabamians.

Dr. Ross has received regional and national recognition for his outstanding leadership through numerous awards and recognitions. Dr. Ross received The Montgomery Advertiser King Spirit Award, K.E.E.P. Production's Young Legend Award, and the Dare to Make a Difference Community Service Award. Dr. Ross also received the Alabama School Board Association's Power of One Award. He has been recognized by Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., locally, statewide, and district-wide as Citizen of the Year. Dr. Ross is the recipient of the Michigan Chronicle Men of Distinction Award. Other awards include the Alabama Adult Education Director's Association Champion Award, Citizen of the Year for the Montgomery Alumni Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., and the Beloved Community Award from the Alabama State University Friends of the Theatre. Dr. Ross also was selected by the Business Council of Alabama as a Business Champion and was the recipient of the Charles Townsel Higher Education Leader Award.

Dr. Ross is a three-time graduate of Alabama State University, where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Political Science, a Master of Education degree in Secondary Education English, and a Doctorate of Education in Educational Leadership, Policy, and Law.

Brother Ross is an active community leader who serves with various local and national civic, professional, and community organizations such as the Montgomery Chamber of Commerce, YMCA Board, I See Me, Inc. board of directors, Montgomery Committee of 100, Alabama Council of Presidents, American Association of State Colleges and Universities, American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, National Education Association, National Council of Higher Education, Alabama Education Association, and 100 Black Men, Inc. He is a member of Goshen Lodge No. He is a member of Goshen Lodge No. 530 and a 33rd-degree mason. A lifetime member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., President Ross serves as the International Chair for the Omega HBCU Education Committee.

His most notable accomplishment is being a loving husband and father of two sons.

Keeping our MWPHGL of Alabama Veterans Informed

New Life Insurance for Veterans with service-connected disability

In January 2023, VA will launch a new life insurance program called Veterans Affairs Life Insurance (VA Life), which provides guaranteed acceptance whole life insurance coverage to Veterans age 80 and under, with any level of service-connected disability. Some Veterans age 81 and older may also be eligible.

What is Guaranteed Acceptance Whole Life Insurance?

Guaranteed acceptance is a whole life policy that does not require a medical exam or ask health questions. It also does not have a limited two-year window to sign up. Whole life insurance provides coverage for the entire life of the individual policyholder, provided that premiums are always paid. Premium rates are locked in for the life of the policy, and unlike term policies will not increase as the policyholder ages.

What benefits does it offer?

Created by Public Law 116-315, the new program meets the needs of service-connected Veterans who may not have previously qualified for life insurance with VA. VA Life offers guaranteed acceptance whole life insurance coverage that lasts for an individual's entire life and provides the following benefits:

- All service-connected Veterans age 80 and under with 0-100% VA disability ratings are eligible.
- Fully automated online enrollment with instant approvals.
- Coverage comes in increments of \$10,000, up to a maximum of \$40,000, and premiums are competitive or better than what's available in the private sector. There is a two-year waiting period for full face value coverage to take effect.
- No medical requirements for enrollment.
- Cash value that builds over the life of the policy after the first two years of enrollment.
- Rates are best the earlier you sign up. Once locked in, premiums will never increase.

Who is eligible?

All Veterans age 80 or younger with a VA disability rating of 0-100% are eligible for VA Life, with no time limit to apply.

Veterans who are 81 or older may apply for VA Life within two years of receiving a new service-connected disability rating if:

- They applied for VA disability compensation before age 81, and.
- They received a new service-connected disability rating after turning 81.

How does this impact other VA Life Insurance programs? VA Life opens life insurance coverage to more service-connected Veterans than ever before. In contrast to Service-Disabled Veterans Life Insurance (S-DVI), VA Life has no medical requirements and there is no two-year time limit to apply if a Veteran is age 80 or under.

Veterans who currently hold an S-DVI policy can either keep their current coverage or apply for VA Life when the application goes live. Veterans can keep their S-DVI policy until the full coverage of VA Life begins two years after enrollment as long as the application is received between Jan. 1, 2023, and Dec. 31, 2025

S-DVI will close to new enrollment after Dec. 31. Veterans interested in S-DVI should apply by this date, even if they are interested in applying for VA Life in the new year. Applying for S-DVI now allows eligible Veterans to have life insurance coverage while waiting for two years for their VA Life coverage to become available.

VA Benefit Payment Rates Increase

The Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA) for VA disability compensation benefits programs became effective on December 1, 2022. The 8.7% COLA increase is for the calendar year 2023.

Veterans and beneficiaries receiving VA disability compensation will notice an increase in their monthly payments, starting January 1, 2023. This annual increase impacts disability benefits, clothing allowance, Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC), as well as other VA assistance programs. If you do not see a difference in the amount, you should contact the VA regional office near you.




P. S. Howard Lodge No. 516 Making a Differnce

District No. 17 Hosts Remembrance Rites and Soil Collection

ur community was honored to come together on November 12, 2022, to remember Robert Mosely, who was lynched in Madison County on March 21, 1890.

Collecting soil from the site of a lynching is an important act of remembrance that will continue the process of reconciliation. Racial lynchings, usually defined as unprosecuted murders, that occurred at the hands of mobs or unidentified people, began in 1877 in Alabama and ended in 1943. More than 300 African-Americans were lynched in Alabama in 66 years. In some cases, the names and dates are incomplete, or the names are unknown.

One of the jars collected on Nov. 12, 2022, will be displayed in Montgomery at the Legacy Museum: From Enslavement to Mass Incarceration. The other will find its home at Huntsville Revisited Museum (2007 North Memorial Parkway, Suite O, Huntsville, AL, United States, Alabama).

District No. 17 believes these ceremonies are steps that must be taken to revisit past injustices - if we are serious about seeing racial healing in our country.
