

In an attempt to give suspended Brothers an • opportunity to become active again during these tough economic times, our Most Worshipful Grand Master has devised a plan named • TARP- Traveling Again Reclamation Program. • This program is designed to allow suspended members to reinstate for a more affordable fee.

Members suspended before June, 2002, can reinstate by paying the following:

- \$25.00 reinstatement fee
- \$25.00 taxes
- \$25.00 registration
- \$50.00 assessment (Have two years to pay the remaining \$150.00)
- \$125.00 Total

2002, can reinstate by paying the following:

Members suspended after June,

- \$25.00 reinstatement fee
- \$25.00 taxes
- \$25.00 registration
- \$50.00 assessment (Have two years to pay the remaining \$200.00)
- \$125.00 Total

TARP serves a two-fold purpose: (1.) It gives suspended Brothers a more affordable means of reinstating and (2.) It gives dying lodges a final opportunity to salvage their existence by increasing their numbers before being forced to close or merge. LET BROTHERLY LOVE PREVAIL

We meet on the level, we act on the plumb, and we part on the square. What does that mean?

No matter the brother, the degree, or the position in life, we as masons are taught to meet each individual, more especially a brother, on the level that they present themselves, act accordingly, and part squarely.

So how do we meet?

In our everyday life, we need to understand the LEVEL on which we should approach each encounter, dilemma, or conversation, whether it be with the initiated or the profane. When we engage with our fellow man, we need to determine if it is during our usual avocation, study, or recreation. Once we obtain the level in which we are engaged, we need to maintain that level of understanding and try our best not to ascend or descend from that plane. The only deviation from this rule, in my humble opinion, is when a person tries to assassinate your character; in that regard, I would like to quote First Lady Michelle Obama in saying, "When they go low, you go high." Do not compromise your integrity or morals, nor should you lower your standards.

Many of us have traveled in freemasonry and have obtained multiple degrees. One may have been fortunate enough to have obtained the 33rd degree. However, if a GIG is talking to an EA, the said GIG has to descend to the level of an EA to have a proper discussion because the EA cannot ascend to the level of a GIG. The only time we should look down on anyone is to help someone up. So, be true to meeting all people from all walks of life that you encounter on the level in which you find them.

How do we act?

In modern times, in our speculation of the plumb from a Freemason's perspective, I see it as one of, if not the hardest tool to set accurately, or live by, in our everyday lives. Depending on the level we meet people, the foundation we set will dictate the accuracy of the plumbline. So, if the foundation is not level, your plumbline, no matter the vertical exactness, will not produce a square result. Think of a clock that has struck six o'clock; the hour and minute hands are vertical in their exactness. We, as fellows and brothers, should, in turn, try to be just as exact. Not 5:55 nor 6:05, but straight up and down like 6:00.

We were told by our parents and stewards to ACT RIGHT when we were children, but as Free and Accepted Masons, we are taught to act UPRIGHT in all of our endeavors. Remember, The ALL-SEEING EYE is always watching. So, whether it's in public or behind closed doors, a plumbline should always be set in hopes of squaring our actions.

How do we part?

If we are regular and in good standing, we should part from a brother on the point at which we met, with both parties on a perpendicular path, depending on their vantage point. So when we choose to part ways, we should be confident that we did everything in our power to meet on the level that is presented, acting in a manner that is parallel or as close to parallel with the plumbline as possible and parted in a way that cements our brotherly love, socially and morally. Hopefully, we each will leave finding ourselves better than how we arrived. Disputes and quarrels are a part of life, but regardless of the nature of the discussion, excluding the violation of one's obligation, regardless of being agreeable or disagreeable, brothers should always find it in their hearts to part peacefully for the sake of maintaining harmony in the craft.

So may we meet, act, and part.

May brotherly love prevail, and never forget that...

From Whence We've Come...

In Their Own Words: MWGM Dr. William O. Jones

This article will highlight one of gems of the Grand Lodge, M.W.G.M. Dr. William O. Jones. In particular, we will review his writings on June 25, 2000.

Greetings:

As we gather here today for our 130th Annual Session, I thank the Lord that he has allowed his tender mercy to smile upon us and has made it possible for all of us to see the beginning of this new millennium. Unfortunately, many brothers did not make it. In memory of those brothers who have passed on since our last Annual Session, we will have our Lodge of Sorrow program on Tuesday evening at 7:00 p.m. in the Mobile Civic Center.

In this troubled world where men and women are questioning the benefits of prayer, religion, and the Bible and in a world where the highest court in the land has ruled that it is unconstitutional to say a prayer in schools, I am so glad that Prince Hall Masons have the right and the privilege to call on the Grand Architect of the Universe to invoke his blessings upon us whenever and wherever we choose. I am going to ask our Assistant Grand Chaplain to come and pray for us and for all the people everywhere.

Pause

Since my last semiannual report in January, 2000, I attended the Phylaxis Society meeting in Kansas City, MO, the 119th Annual Session of the United Supreme Council of the Northern Jurisdiction in Denver, CO, the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge Session of the Jurisdiction of Oklahoma in Tulsa, OK, and the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge Session of the Jurisdiction of Georgia.

During the Masonic year ending June 30, 2000, we have collected \$622,219.00, which has been distributed, to our several accounts as provided by law, and we have a "counted" membership on the rolls of the Endowment Department of 22,983. At this point, I am requesting Rev. Jesse Montgomery, Grand District Deputy of District #13, to please come forward and award the prizes and escort the winners to their seats of honor.

District Meetings

Our District Meetings began during the last week of March 2000, and ended during the third week of May. I want to extend my congratulations to all Grand District Deputies and to their assistants for having outstanding meetings. I traveled approximately 3,100 miles throughout the 17 districts at a total cost of approximately \$3,114.86 for lodging, meals, and fuel. The increase in cost over last year was mainly due to the increase in automobile fuel prices this year.

The District Meetings were well attended, and the brothers' enthusiasm was extremely high. The highlight of the meetings was the [question-and-answer] period that followed the Grand Master's presentation. The brothers indicated that this period gave them the opportunity to ask questions that were important to them and to get advice and directions from the Grand Master. As a matter of fact, I intend to continue this question and answer period during future meetings.

Bank Accounts

All of our bank accounts remain the same at Citizens Federal Savings Bank in Birmingham, Alabama

Relations with Insurance Department

Our relationship with the State Insurance Department has changed since our last report. As you know, in the past, we have been audited periodically by the State agency because it states that we sell insurance policies to our members, and therefore, we must fall under their jurisdiction just like the big insurance companies (i.e., Alfa, Metropolitan, New York Life, etc.). Because of the hard work of our Grand Attorney, Brother Tyrone Means, we were able to draft a bill and get the bill passed in the House of Representatives and in the Senate, which exempts the Masonic and similar organizations that provide an opportunity for their members to purchase death benefits for their beneficiaries. This was a very difficult task, and many of you also had to work hard lobbying members of the House and the Senate to get this bill passed. For this, I am expressing my sincere thanks to you and to Attorney Means for a job well done.

Temple Operations

The Temple in downtown Birmingham, Alabama, on the comer of 4"' Avenue and 17th Street North is our principle real estate holding. The building is well built and is in fairly good condition. However, we must investigate the possibility of having to do some extensive renovations to remove asbestos from the building, to convert a coal burning furnace to gas or oil burning furnace, to remove and to install new wiring where needed to conform to city codes, and to replace the roof and the elevators. All of these repairs will be expensive, but we must have them done in order to maintain our property in good condition.

Recommendation

The following recommendations are made for the current year. I recommend that the Grand Lodge donate:

- \$500 to the NAACP,
- \$500 to the NAACP Legal Defense Fund,
- \$1,000 to the Independent Economic Study Commission, and
- \$500 to the YMCA.

In addition, I recommend that the Grand Lodge purchase or lease the necessary equipment and furnishings for the Grand Master's office. I further recommend that the Grand Lodge spend the necessary funds to paint, renovate, update, and improve all Grand Lodge properties.

Report of Officers

The following officers and committees will make their report for this year. Unless you request otherwise, the reports will be given as follows: Deputy Grand Master, Grand Medical Registrar, Grand Attorney, Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer, Grand Lodge Auditing Committee, Endowment Secretary, Endowment Treasurer, Grand Auditor, Educational Committee, and Trustees.

Conclusion

"Looking back in order to move forward!" I said, "Looking back in order to move forward!" I have been looking back over the operations of this Grand Lodge to see how we can improve our entire operation. I know that there is a saying, "You should never look back." Well, I do not totally agree with that. For example, if you are parked on the side of a busy highway, you must look back to see what is coming before you pull out into the road to go forward.

We also study history to learn about what happened in the past in order to have a better appreciation for what has happened in order to plot a course for the future. Strategies must be developed to ensure that whatever mistakes we made in the past will not continue to be made in the future.

"Looking back in order to move forward!" The question then becomes, "What did I find while looking back in order to move forward?" I found many, many positive things that had been done by good black men who made great sacrifices to keep this Prince Hall group functioning and providing service to Black Americans. Many of our brothers had been active in their local lodges for 50 and 60 years and had never missed a year paying their dues no matter how hard times were for them. There is evidence of their work with youth and with other groups in their communities and evidence of how they fought the clinches of segregation. Our Temple in Birmingham represents one example of how they tried to find a way for Black Americans to have a place to congregate, a place in which they would feel comfortable and safe. One of our brothers that was a victim of the Syphilis Study in Tuskegee was almost 100 years old, but he still was active in his lodge. Brother Herman Shaw who went to the White House, sat next to the President of the United States, and made an eloquent public response on national television to the President's apology was still active in his lodge when he died. Nothing shook Brother Shaw's faith in Prince Hall masonry.

I found that most masons were well known in their communities because they were visible in their communities as masons. They worked hard in their communities to make things better for everyone. They provided service on a continuous basis, and people knew who they were. I found the answer to the question, "Who are the Prince Hall Masons," and I will give you the answer a little later as I continue here.

On the other hand, I found some things of which I am not at all proud. I found some masons who have not acted in accordance with the landmarks and the standards of Prince Hall masonry. For example, our Prince Hall Grand Lodge has always been known for providing financial assistance to brothers who were in need and to brothers who wanted to provide better things for their families, but they were held back because the same borrowing opportunities provided for the white race were not available for Black men. This Grand Lodge made every effort to lend money to its members at almost no interest rate in comparison to that being charged by banks and in most cases required no collateral. Such an opportunity was unheard of by most people. Any brother should have been so grateful to this Grand Lodge that he would have done everything humanly possible to pay these loans back, so the next brother in need could have the same borrowing opportunity. "Looking back in order to move forward!" What did I find while looking back?

I found that many brothers had borrowed money from this Grand Lodge many years ago and had never paid that money back. They were not even trying to pay it back, and they had not made any effort to offer any type of insurance or collateral to cover their loan. They had let your loan become a gift to them, a gift which they knew this Grand Lodge could not afford to give. They did not care about the next brother who might need help; they had what they wanted, and they were satisfied.

I also found that some lodges are collecting money from their members for dues, but this money is never sent to the Grand Lodge. Brothers have called to inquire about their financial status because they think their dues have been sent to the Grand Lodge, and they find that their dues are in arrears. Where is the money going? Is this acceptable behavior for a Prince Hall Mason or for anyone?

Who are we? Is this all we represent? I don't think so. We must stop this practice immediately! The Grand Lodge will not tolerate this type of action any longer. Brothers, this money belongs to you, and I hate that a few brothers have gotten this Grand Lodge to the point of having to stop making loans to honest brothers who need it and would pay their loans back, if they bad the same opportunity to borrow. As your leader, I have instructed our Grand Attorney, Brother Tyrone Means, to take whatever legal steps necessary to collect all money overdue to this Grand Lodge. Opportunities have been provided for all brothers to bring their loans to current status; some brothers responded positively, but other simply ignored our plea. Therefore, if it means going to court to collect what is owed to this Grand Lodge, that is what Attorney Means will have to do, and in some cases, that is what we have already done.

I have requested that all Worshipful Masters display the monthly lodge rolls received from the Endowment Department at every meeting in order that each brother can check the roll to make sure that the money he paid has been applied to his dues at the Grand Lodge.

"Looking back in order to move forward!" I have even looked at our Grand Lodge membership and have compared it to the list of names on the Temple and on the consistory membership lists. What did I find? I found that we have brothers that have been dropped from the lodge roll for failure to pay dues but are listed as members in good standing in the local temple and in the local consistory. How can that be possible? Brothers, if one is not financial with the Blue Lodge, he cannot be an active member in any of the upper houses, such as the Shriners and the Consistories.

"Looking back in order to move forward!" In looking back, I found many, many good things that we can build on as we move this Grand Lodge forward. I also found some things that we need to correct that will make us even stronger than we have ever been. How can we do this? We must get back to being visible again in our communities, so people will know what we stand for and who we are.

Well, who are we? I'll tell you who we are. We are the Prince Hall Masons! We are the people of an ancestry that authored a legacy through their deeds and declarations; our Prince Hall Mason forefathers sounded the chords of the nation to pause and to ponder-what manner of people are these? Historically, we were those with little more that a nickel and a nail in our pockets who started out against all odds to capture a vision-and we rose again and again as stalwarts in the storm, as giants in our chosen field of endeavor - sometimes we stumble, but we refuse to fall; we became tired, but we refused to quit; we bent, but we refused to break. The hallmark of our success as Prince Hall Masons has been our unique utilization of the tools of survival.

We can point to our rich and pure heritage - Booker T. Washington, Justice Thurgood Marshall, George Washington Carver, Martin Luther King, Jr., S. J. Bennett, Sr., and R. D. Nesbitt, Sr. We are the products of suffering and sacrifice. We are strong; we are talented; we are creative, and we have imagination. Our capabilities are diverse, and our qualifications are excellent.

Who are we? We are the scholars, the scientists, the educators, the lawyers, the preachers, the doctors, the businessmen, the farmers, the trash collectors, the janitors, the street sweepers, the plumbers, the electricians, the carpenters, and the truck drivers. We are the implementers, the innovators, the creators, and the orators - we are men of courage and men of substance. We are thinkers and doers. We are today's choice and tomorrow's challenge.

Who are we? We are black people, and we are proud people! We want people to know us because Prince Hall Masons' story must be continued in this new millennium. Who are we? Who are we? Who are we? We are Alabama Prince Hall Masons, and we are on the move!

Investing as New Parents

When you become a parent for the first time, the realization that another life depends on you financially can be overwhelming, especially if you haven't thought much about your finances or investing goals before. This may be the first time you're developing a real investing plan, or maybe you already have a plan that you're looking to overhaul in response to your life event. Your goals and investing strategy will probably need to change when you become a parent, but not necessarily in the ways you're expecting.

Balancing Your Goals

Before you became a parent, you likely had a long-term investing goal of retirement. Perhaps there were short-term goals too, such as buying a house or another large purchase. Adding a child to the family introduces a new short-term goal: paying for his or her college education. In addition to your investing goals, you might have debt to pay down, an emergency fund to build up and a budget that needs to find a balance among all of your new childcare costs.

Many new parents become overwhelmed by the cost

of pregnancy, childbirth and raising a young child—between paying for day care and buying new clothes every few months, it can be hard to keep focused on investing for retirement. The best-case scenario is to continue making regular contributions to your retirement accounts even after the baby is born.

While the diaper budget may be out of control now, you don't want to sacrifice the power of compound interest by neglecting your retirement savings. If you have an employer-sponsored plan with a match, make sure you at least meet the minimum contribution to receive the match. Otherwise, you're leaving money on the table.

It may not be possible to continue to invest as much while budgeting for the new expenses that come with child-rearing, so the important thing to keep in

mind is balance. Try not to focus all of your money and attention on baby spending, and don't ignore your long-term savings goals completely. Your first priority will have to be day-to-day spending and budgeting, followed by your retirement savings. When these two goals are being met, you can add your child's college education as a third priority.

Abandoning your investing goals in favor of a child's education is actually not putting the child first—if you retire with nothing, your child will be left supporting aging parents.

Saving for College

You may be tempted to put your child's education fund first. There's nothing wrong with putting your children first, but abandoning your investing goals in favor of a child's education is actually not putting the child first—if you retire with nothing, your child will be left supporting aging parents, which can be much more difficult than funding a four-year degree. Students have access to scholarships, work-study programs and student loans when funding their college degree, but there's no financial aid for retirement.

That said, investing in your child's education early in his or her life is a good idea if you can afford it. Compound interest can be just as magical for your child's college savings as for your retirement account. You can start saving for college even when your child is only an infant, either in traditional investment vehicles or in a 529 plan, which is a tax -deferred plan designed specifically for education costs. As long as the earnings are used for qualified education expenses, the account grows free of federal (and often state) taxes. Just like a 401(k) or IRA, 529 plans have annual contribution limits, but you can ask grandparents and other family members to contribute to the account as well, as an alternative for birthday gifts for your child. Another upside to 529 plans is that the funds can be used any time in the future, and the beneficiary can change. An alternative to the 529 plan is the Roth IRA, from which you can withdraw the principle at any time without facing penalties. You can also make tax-free withdrawals of the earnings from the account if they're used for qualified educational expenses. If you haven't set up a designated college savings account, or if you decide a 529 plan is not for you, a Roth can be a viable alternative to use instead.

Revisit Your Strategy

Your lifestyle will likely look dramatically different once you become a parent, and the same goes

for your finances and investing strategy. The budget may be tighter, decreasing your weekly savings amount. You may want to take on less risk to account for your new financial responsibilities. Or maybe you'll seek out higher risk investments to make up for your diminished

contributions. As you work to balance your short - and long-term goals, your investing time horizons may change, too, prompting a reassessment of your asset allocation. You should be regularly rebalancing your portfolio anyway. If you aren't, now is a good time to start. Now that your goals have changed, your strategy must as well.

The most important thing to remember is that you shouldn't abandon your good financial habits just because you now have a child. Keep your long-term goals in mind as you readjust your finances and get acquainted with your growing family.

Mental Health Is Just As Important As Your Physical Health



What is mental health?

Mental health includes our emotional, psychological, and social well-being. It affects how we think, feel, and act. It also helps determine how we handle stress, relate to others, and make healthy choices. Mental health is important at every stage of life, from childhood and adolescence through adulthood.

Why is mental health important for overall health?

Mental and physical health are equally important components of overall health. For example, depression increases the risk for many types of physical health problems, particularly long-lasting conditions like diabetes, heart disease, and stroke. Similarly, the presence of chronic conditions can increase the risk for mental illness.

Can your mental health change over time?

Yes, it's important to remember that a person's mental health can change over time, depending on many factors. When the demands placed on a person exceed their resources and coping abilities, their mental health could be impacted. For example, if someone is working long hours, caring for a relative, or experiencing economic hardship, they may experience poor mental health.

How common are mental illnesses?

Mental illnesses are among the most common health conditions in the United States.

- More than 1 in 5 US adults live with a mental illness.
- Over 1 in 5 youth (ages 13-18) either currently or at some point during their life, have had a seriously debilitating mental illness.
- About 1 in 25 U.S. adults lives with a serious mental illness, such as schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, or major depression (ref: World Health Organization 2023).

What causes mental illness?

There is no single cause for mental illness. A number of factors can contribute to risk for mental illness, such as:

- Adverse Childhood Experiences, such as trauma or a history of abuse (for example, child abuse, sexual assault, witnessing violence, etc.)
- Experiences related to other ongoing (chronic) medical conditions, such as cancer or diabetes
- Biological factors or chemical imbalances in the brain
- Use of alcohol or drugs
- Having feelings of loneliness or isolation

Measures for maintaining good mental health

There are also a number of factors can contribute to the improvement of your overall mental health, such as:

- Take the time to eat well.
- Be sure to get enough sleep.
- Keep active or exercise every day.
- Engage in activities that promote relaxation and well-being (yoga, meditation and breathing exercises, creative or artistic exercises).

Keeping our MWPHGL of Alabama Veterans Informed

VA's commitment to Veterans regarding health care and benefits

he VA is committed to ensuring every Veteran is aware of the care and benefits they've earned by their service. Whether the veteran is new to VA or has been receiving care and benefits for years, veterans can now receive toxic exposure screening, and take steps to file a claim for toxic exposure. Although this effort is expected to draw many Veterans seeking assistance on recently passed legislation concerning toxic exposures (via the "PACT Act"), VA welcomes all Veterans and survivors seeking assistance for VA benefits and services.

VA is delivering more benefits, and quicker, to more Veterans than ever before. As of March 4, VA has received more than 362,000 toxic exposure-related claims from Veterans since the legislation passed on August 10, 2022. In the past six months, VA has completed nearly 158,000 PACT Act-related claims for all Veterans and survivors, including terminally ill Veterans.

Outreach initiatives, such as the ones currently underway, will continue for the foreseeable future until every Veteran or survivor has had an opportunity to learn more about the health care and benefits, they earned. VA Geriatric Programs at a Glance

The GRECC (Geriatric Research, Education, and Clinical Centers) Connect program aims to improve access to geriatric care for Veterans in rural areas. This project allows elderly veterans to receive real-time virtual care from geriatricians, eliminating the need to travel long distances for specialty care. Since 2014, the GRECC Connect project has served more than 10,000 veterans, supported more than 4,700 providers and staff, and saved veterans nearly 890,000 miles of travel.

The Geriatric Scholars program trains local VA clinicians to provide care to older rural veterans helping to overcome the critical provider shortage in rural communities. Geriatric Scholars Program increases aging rural Veterans' access to quality care by integrating geriatrics into existing services at local VA community-based outpatient clinics (CBOCs). Since 2008, the Geriatric Scholars program has trained more than 1,000 VA clinicians. Those providers have collectively served more than 680,000 Veterans. Gerofit uses telehealth to connect rural Veterans over the age of 65 with exercise programming to improve their physical and mental health and overall well-being. Veterans receive guidance from trained exercise staff, including physiologists, nurses, and physical therapists. Gerofit is now offered at 30 VA Health Care Systems. 


R.H. Rice Lodge No. 345 Hosts Annual St. John's Day Family and Friends Celebration


